How do we tell the difference?

- First, saturate our minds with the Scriptures.
- Second, look at the character of what is being heard;
 in other words, is it God-like, devil-like, or me-like?

What is God like?

What is the devil like?

What are you and I like?

Even more difficult than distinguishing the Holy Spirit from the enemy is telling the difference between the Holy Spirit and our own hearts.

Three suggestions for proper discernment:

- 1) Take your time
- 2) Beware your wounds
- 3) Know your passions

"Speak for Your Servant is Listening"

1 Samuel 3:1-10

When have you had a kind of "inner voice" say something? Did you ignore it or obey it?

When you became a Christian what happened to you?

Do you believe God speaks to you directly, specifically, personally?

What are five specific things the Holy Spirit will do (*John* 16:7-15)?

- 1. convict the world
- 2. guide into all truth
- 3. speak only what He hears
- 4. tell what is yet to come
- 5. "take from what is mine and make it known to you"

The Holy Spirit is not "it". The Holy Spirit is a Person. The Holy Spirit is an involved, life-giving, Divine Person, with whom the Bible promises fellowship. (2 Corinthians 13:14)
This fellowship is to be a regular and experiential companionship.
The Holy Spirit provides direction for daily living – we are told to be "led by the Spirit" (Romans 8:14), "filled with the Spirit" (Ephesians 5:18).
We are to "pray in the Spirit" (Ephesians 6:18), "live by the Spirit" (Galatians 5:16), and "keep in step with the Spirit" (Galatians 5:25).
All these well-known commands assume that the Holy Spirit speaks to us personally in ways we can understand.
How does the Holy Spirit speak personally?

- The most common and certain way is through the Bible.

 2 Timothy 3:16

 2 Peter 1:20-21
 We find the words "the Lord said" associated with visions, dreams, an audible voice, angels, prophetic messages, and physical signs.
- 3) We find the language of God's personal conversation described in *1 Kings 19:12* as a gentle whisper.
- 4) It may come as a simple thought, one we "sense" more than "think".
 - It's Spirit to spirit speech.

Our inner impressions are not always God speaking. Our thoughts can come from one of three sources:

- 1) God
- 2) the demonic
- 3) ourselves
